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ACADEMIC WORK

The enrollment for the regular session, 1931-32, was 1198 students; for the summer session of 1932, 2145; for the year, 3343, a loss of 173 students in twelve months. One hundred and thirteen students have applied for degrees to be conferred at the close of the current summer session. The total number of degrees conferred for the twelve months will, therefore, be 183, or ten more than in the year preceding. The enrollment in the junior and senior classes for the twelve months is 1171 students or 35 per cent of the total number enrolled, a very slight increase in the relative size of the junior and senior classes of the year before, but a heavy increase over the years 1928-29, the percentages of which were respectively 25.8 and 29.1. This annual increase in the relative size of the upper classes is indicative of a healthy trend.

A greatly curtailed budget for the summer session has presented an administrative problem which, thanks to the unselfish devotion of the members of the Faculty, it has been practicable for the college to meet without impairing the customary high quality of instruction offered in the summer session. The chief expedient resorted to has been large classes. It would be futile to argue that the instruction in an extremely large class can be made as thorough as in a class of more reasonable size. It is hoped, therefore, that appropriations for summer sessions in the future will be sufficient to make unnecessary such mass instruction. But in the present emergency the large classes were far from unsatisfactory in many instances because of the splendid spirit of cooperation manifested by the members thereof. A comparison of the facts for the first half-term of the summer session of 1930 with that of the present summer session shows an increase in the number of sections containing more than sixty students and a decrease in the number of sections containing fewer than sixty students. It will be noted also that the average class size for the present session is 35.8 students; that of 1930, 31.8 students. It should be stated, moreover, that it was necessary to reduce the number of individual subjects offered from 126 last year to 117 in the present session. Most of the restrictions, however, were made in English and Education, the two largest departments of the college, so that no student was seriously handicapped in consequence thereof.

STUDENT LIFE ACTIVITIES

In order that the student body may have pleasant and home-like surroundings, the college provides opportunities for varied social and competitive contacts, and a large per cent of the students avail themselves of such opportunities. Regular schedules in all major sports have been played during the past year, and a well-rounded intramural program has been offered in ~~which more than fifty per cent of the student body participated.~~ The lyceum and lecture division has also offered a splendid program. About twenty lecturers have spoken from our platforms, and the organizations in the college have given a number of valuable and interesting entertainments.

During the last two or three years, disciplinary problems have been conspicuous by their absence. Less money is being spent by students and perhaps less time squandered. More and more students are coming to the most economical means of living. Among other signs of improvement is the constantly diminishing list of ineligible students for participation in extra-curricular activities. On the whole, I consider the year a very successful one, and am confident that the spirit in the student body is splendid.

IMPROVEMENTS

A new gymnasium has been completed at a total cost of \$41,000 and has been in use since June 1, 1932. With the exception of \$7,000 of State Funds spent in the installation of heating system, the building was constructed from insurance, local funds, and student funds. Two hundred eighty feet of concrete walls and a concrete bridge add to the convenience and attractiveness at Riverside. A new section of tennis courts at Riverside Park enlarges the facilities of students for physical education.
