(phone ringing)

NEAL: Hello.

JIM: Hello, Steve?

NEAL: I'm sorry, he stepped out.

JIM: Oh, this is Jim. Is David there?

NEAL: Jim?

JIM: Yeah.

NEAL: Yeah. Do you want to speak to him?

JIM: Yeah. Who's this?

NEAL: This is Neal.

JIM: Are you doing okay?

NEAL: Doing fine, sir.

JIM: Okay, good. You're not hurt, are you?

NEAL: No.

JIM: Okay. Good.

NEAL: Okay. Here he is.

DAVID: Say, Jim.

JIM: David, how are you?

DAVID: Look, when we send Kevin out --

JIM: Okay.

1                   DAVID:  -- a couple of the guys picked up a  
2 couple of pistols that your boys left behind.

3                   JIM:  Oh, okay.

4                   DAVID:  And I've demagged them and I've  
5 taken the top railings completely apart.

6                   JIM:  Right.

7                   DAVID:  And the way I want -- I want these  
8 guys to have these things back and the way I want to  
9 do this is, is when the girls drive up to drop Kevin  
10 and the doggies off, just have the agents go to the --  
11 no, I'll tell you what.  I'll put them in a --

12                   JIM:  Just leave them in there, David.  
13 Listen, I appreciate --

14                   DAVID:  -- some plastic on the front of the  
15 car, see-through plastic, so they can see them on the  
16 -- you know, it's daylight anyway.

17                   JIM:  Hey, I don't need them.  You're a good  
18 word that you've got them in a safe place that the  
19 children can't get them, is all I need.  That's all I  
20 need.  You just tell me --

21                   DAVID:  Well, we don't need them here.

22                   JIM:  Well, I know that but just put them  
23 somewhere safely that the kids won't get them and  
24 unload it and that's good enough for me, really.  I  
25 appreciate you telling me that.  And --

1                   DAVID: I just thought these guys might want  
2 them back.

3                   JIM: Well, just leave them there. Just  
4 leave them there.

5                   DAVID: All right.

6                   JIM: Listen, it's my understanding that,  
7 you know, after you and I talked for awhile and I got  
8 the Bible, as you asked, that -- what was his name,  
9 Kevin?

10                  DAVID: Yeah.

11                  JIM: Kevin had come out with some puppies,  
12 is that right?

13                  DAVID: Yeah.

14                  JIM: Okay. And -- oh, maybe I got the name  
15 wrong. Was it Kevin or was it Mark?

16                  DAVID: Mark, I'm sorry.

17                  JIM: Okay, okay. Okay, Mark and the  
18 puppies. I've made those arrangements, by the way.

19                  DAVID: All right.

20                  JIM: And I really appreciate the thing  
21 about the guns. You were able to get them unloaded?

22                  DAVID: Oh, yeah.

23                  JIM: Okay.

24                  DAVID: Yeah. I took the slide off and  
25 everything.

1 JIM: Well, you're pretty good on --

2 DAVID: The guys -- well, like I say --

3 JIM: Some people don't know how to work the  
4 gun safely.

5 DAVID: Yeah, I know about firearms.

6 JIM: Well, good. I'm glad. Remember you  
7 told me the other day some guy in there cranked the  
8 round off when he pulled the magazine out and --

9 DAVID: No, they thought it was empty.

10 JIM: Oh, he thought -- yeah, but you should  
11 -- that won't happen to you. That's good somebody can  
12 handle them safely in there anyway. I know that's  
13 good.

14 DAVID: Remember, Jim, the majority of --  
15 remember, 75% of the Bible is nothing but about Israel  
16 being expert in war. And the Jews are still that way,  
17 aren't they?

18 JIM: I guess so. That's right. That's  
19 true, yeah. They have a lot of trouble over there,  
20 don't they?

21 DAVID: You know, when you get slaughtered  
22 out and stuff like that, when you're whole history  
23 book is nothing but a Bible of how it -- you get  
24 slaughtered out, you know, you either eventually learn  
25 to, to trust in God and to utilize your principles of

1 creation or you simply just get slaughtered out.

2 JIM: I understand. Did you, did you find  
3 anymore firearms there or was it just two, David?

4 DAVID: Just two. Did anybody else leave  
5 anything? I mean --

6 JIM: What -- did you find any radios on  
7 there, walkie-talkie things?

8 DAVID: No, like I said, this was only on  
9 the inside perimeter cause, you know, no one's going  
10 to be walking on the outside anyway.

11 JIM: Yeah. I went to see one of the agents  
12 who was hurt in the hospital --

13 DAVID: Uh-huh.

14 JIM: -- the night before last. And --

15 DAVID: One of your buddies?

16 JIM: Yeah, I've known the guy. He, he's  
17 doing okay, you know. They gave him a lot of good  
18 care in there and he's doing all right. He's asking  
19 about you guys. But I said, oh, man, they're going to  
20 be all right. We're talking with him and, you know.  
21 So, everything's okay. But go ahead, I've got the  
22 Bible. So, weren't you going to tell me about some --

23 DAVID: Well, you know, it's like, you know,  
24 when I talk to people, I, I see very clearly that a  
25 lot of people -- like I say, they, they flaunt their

1 ignorance about the facts in regards to the Gospel.  
2 You know, they pick out one or two little sweet  
3 statements that their mamma read to them or the  
4 preacher said in Sunday school.

5 JIM: And they think like they're pious or  
6 something. I know --

7 DAVID: Well, no, it's not so much that. It  
8 says -- like Paul says, Paul says, you know, that they  
9 have -- talking about the Jews in his day that he was  
10 fighting with.

11 JIM: Uh-huh.

12 DAVID: Remember, you know, Paul the Apostle  
13 was a killer, wasn't he?

14 JIM: Uh-huh.

15 DAVID: He killed Christians, didn't he?  
16 Remember that?

17 JIM: Yeah, uh-huh.

18 DAVID: That's terrible, isn't it?

19 JIM: Yeah.

20 DAVID: The Bible is a whole book about  
21 nothing but killing. Anyway -- so the thing was --  
22 Paul says, he says, I will, I will not deny that they  
23 have a zeal but not according to knowledge he says.  
24 You know, a lot of people are zealous for things, like  
25 people keep Christmas. Why do they keep Christmas

1 for? It's not the birthday of Christ, you know. It  
2 traces back to the time of celebration of Nimrod, you  
3 know. It's got pagan. It's a paganistic tradition.  
4 It's not a, not a thing to do with Christ but yet they  
call it Christ's mass.

5 (Unidentified person in the background  
6 talking to David).

7 DAVID: Do what, Jeff?

8 (Unidentified person in the background  
9 talking to David).

10 DAVID: Maybe they're going to come over  
11 here and blow us up.

12 JIM: What did he say, David, tell me. I  
couldn't hear.

13 DAVID: Oh, he was just talking about the  
14 tanks moving on our property. I told him not to worry  
15 about it.

16 JIM: Oh. We told you they'd be moving.  
17 That's just a shift change.

18 DAVID: Well, they're just down on our  
property now.

19 JIM: They are?

20 DAVID: Oh, yeah.

21 JIM: Where, in the back, in the front?

22 DAVID: Yeah. They're talking on the radio

1 that we're terrorists now. So, --

2 JIM: Oh, that's the media.

3 DAVID: -- no negotiation.

4 JIM: That's the media. Don't listen to  
5 them.

6 DAVID: Well, the thing of it is, like I  
7 say, my God told me to wait and --

8 JIM: I understand.

9 DAVID: -- he -- anyway, these tanks --

10 JIM: What do they look like? I haven't  
11 seen one of those things.

12 DAVID: The way Nahum says -- what?

13 (Unidentified person in the background  
14 talking to David).

15 DAVID: Yeah, I know, they're going to blow  
16 us up.

17 JIM: No, nobody is going to blow you up.

18 DAVID: Well, it's on our road.

19 JIM: Yeah.

20 DAVID: It's on the property.

21 JIM: It's not moving closer. It's --  
22 they're just changing --

23 DAVID: No, it is. It's at Bob's bus now.  
24 It's on our property.

25 JIM: We're just trying to look out for our

1 people. We don't want anybody to get hurt.

2 DAVID: Well, let me --

3 JIM: That's all that is.

4 DAVID: -- try to get some Nahum to you  
5 before they start --

6 JIM: Get some what?

7 DAVID: -- doing what they're doing.

8 JIM: Oh, okay. Well, they're not going to  
9 do anything.

10 DAVID: Well, they'll just get into  
11 position.

12 JIM: Fellow, hey --

13 DAVID: Huh?

14 JIM: David, they're -- I give you my word,  
15 they're not coming in there.

16 DAVID: They are in the property this time,  
17 all the way in.

18 JIM: But they're not coming any closer and  
19 they're just -- they don't have any guns on those, you  
20 know, they're just armored.

21 DAVID: Yeah. I'm telling you, like I said,  
22 but, you know, they've got to do what they've got to  
23 do.

24 JIM: Well, the tactical guys worry, they  
25 worry about snipers, you know. And that's --

1                   DAVID: Worry about -- okay, Jim. We're  
2 looking at Nahum, okay?

3                   JIM: Okay.

4                   DAVID: Have you got Nahum in your Bible  
5 there?

6                   JIM: Well, let me look. Hold on a minute.  
7 Tell me where it is.

8                   DAVID: Okay. It's right after the Book of  
9 Micah. You look in the front of your -- Okay. You  
10 got King James or New American Standard or what?

11                   JIM: I've got -- hold on a minute -- New  
12 Testament.

13                   DAVID: This is in the prophets.

14                   JIM: Okay, in the prophets. All right,  
15 wait a minute.

16                   DAVID: You just got New Testament?

17                   JIM: Yeah, I just -- that's what I have.

18                   DAVID: Oh, yeah, oh, well.

19                   JIM: Give me, give me the -- Old Testament.  
20 Okay. That's what I want. Oh, here it is, okay,  
21 Micah 6 and 7?

22                   DAVID: No, that's -- this --

23                   JIM: Oh, Nahum, okay. I got Chapter 1.

24                   DAVID: Okay. The burden of Ninevah.  
25 Ninevah was the capital city of Assyria, ancient

1 Assyria. Now, in this prophecy it says the -- Verse 2  
2 there -- you see it?

3 JIM: Verse 2, okay. Wait a minute. Let's  
4 see -- chapter -- what chapter is that, 1?

5 DAVID: Chapter 1.

6 JIM: Yeah, Verse 2, where God is jealous?

7 DAVID: Right.

8 JIM: Okay.

9 DAVID: Now, God is jealous and the Lord  
10 revengeth. I mean the Lord is beating some butt,  
11 right?

12 JIM: Uh-huh.

13 DAVID: The Lord is revengeth and furious.  
14 I mean have you ever heard of an angry God?

15 JIM: Yeah.

16 DAVID: Okay, the Lord will take vengeance on  
17 his what?

18 JIM: Adversaries.

19 DAVID: They're the ones who dare challenge  
20 him, right?

21 JIM: Uh-huh.

22 DAVID: For his what?

1                   JIM: His enemies.

2                   DAVID: His enemies, yeah. Now, you know,  
3 like I told you, I said the Lord told me to wait,  
4 right?

5                   JIM: Uh-huh.

6                   DAVID: The Lord is slow to anger and great  
7 in power and will not at all acquit the wicked. Just  
8 like you, there's no way you would ever acquit me,  
9 okay. So, likewise --

10                  JIM: Well, you --

11                  DAVID: Likewise. Those who do wickedly,  
12 God is not acquitting them even though they're still  
13 allowed to be free as it seems. The Lord hath his way  
14 in the whirlwind. In Jeremiah 31 it says the fierce  
15 anger of the Lord shall not return until he's  
16 performed the intents of his heart. That's Psalm 45,  
17 right, my heart is inditing a good matter. Remember  
18 that?

19                  JIM: Uh-huh.

20                  DAVID: So, in the latter days you shall  
21 consider it perfectly. That's what you, you guys are  
22 doing. That's what everyone that heard the radio  
23 program the other night were given a chance to do,  
24 they were given a chance to consider, to consider what  
25 I was saying which is what God says in the book. Now,

1 okay, and in the storm of the clouds of the dust of  
2 his feet, he rebuketh the sea and maketh it dry, dried  
3 up all the rivers. Bashan, languiseth, Carmel, the  
4 flower of Lebanon languisheth.

5 The mountains quake at him and the hills  
6 melt. The earth is burned at his presence. Yea, the  
7 world and all that dwell therein.

8 So, it's a worldwide event, isn't it? Huh?

9 JIM: Yeah, I suppose.

10 DAVID: Pretty hot, right. So, the prophet  
11 says who can stand before his indignation. Who can  
12 abide in fierceness of his anger. His fury is poured  
13 out like fire and the rocks are thrown down by him.

14 So, you know, that's one aspect of God,  
15 isn't it?

16 JIM: Uh-huh.

17 DAVID: But it says that the Lord is good, a  
18 strong hold in the day of trouble and he knows them  
19 that trust in him. But with an over running flood, he  
20 will make an utter end of the place thereof and  
21 darkness shall pursue his enemies. See, his enemies  
22 won't know about this, will they? Right? The enemies  
23 won't know the meaning of this prophecy, will they?

24 JIM: No, I don't guess they will.

25 DAVID: No. So, God questions by saying,

1 | what do you imagine against the Lord? Now, what do  
2 | you guys think you're doing? He will make an utter  
3 | end. Affliction shall not rise up the second time.  
4 | Sure, yeah, okay, come on, come on out, Dave. Let's  
5 | go up here to the, to the modern day, present day, you  
6 | know, politicians, right. Well, see, God's gathering  
7 | the people together, isn't he? There's some enemies  
8 | in this vision. For while they be folden together as  
9 | thorns and while they are drunken as drunkards --  
10 | these people are out of their mind -- they shall be  
11 | devoured as stubble fully dry.

11 |           There is one come out of thee that imagineth  
12 | evil against the Lord, a wicked counsellor. Now, who  
13 | are they imagining evil against?

13 |           JIM: The Lord?

14 |           DAVID: The Lord. And what's their counsel?  
15 | It's wicked, isn't it?

16 |           JIM: Uh-huh.

17 |           DAVID: Thus saith say the Lord, though they  
18 | be quiet and likewise many -- even though there's a  
19 | bunch of these guys, right --

19 |           JIM: Right.

20 |           DAVID: -- yet thus shall they be cut down  
21 | when he shall pass through. God is going to knock  
22 | them out, isn't he?

1 JIM: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: Though I have afflicted thee, I will  
3 afflict thee no more. He's talking about God's people  
4 now.

5 JIM: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: For now will I break his yoke from  
7 off thee and will burst thy bonds asunder. So, in  
8 this vision, there's a people that trust in God and  
9 yet they kind of have a yoke on their neck, don't  
10 they?

11 JIM: Uh-huh.

12 DAVID: This belligerent power here, though  
13 there's many of them, they have to be dealt with by  
14 God, don't they? And the Lord hath given commandment  
15 concerning thee, that no more thy name be sown out of  
16 the house of thy gods will I cut off thy graven image  
17 and the molten image. I'll make thy grave for thou  
18 are vile.

19 Now, here comes the prophecy of Messiah.  
20 Behold upon the mountains the feet of him that  
21 bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace. O  
22 Judah, keep thy solemn feasts, perform thy vows, for  
23 the wicked shall no more pass through the, he is  
24 utterly cut off.

25 So, the Gospel, the good news is to who, the



1 wicked or to the people that trust in God? Okay.

2 Now, what about these people that trust in God?

3 Chapter 2 begins to explain.

4 He that dasheth in pieces -- right?

5 JIM: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: Which is the belligerent power, has  
7 come up before thy face. What does God say for these  
8 people to do, keep the what?

9 JIM: Munition.

10 DAVID: What's munition? It's ammunition,  
11 isn't it?

12 JIM: I'm sure it is.

13 DAVID: Watch the way, make thy loins  
14 strong, fortify thy power how? Mightily. The Lord  
15 hath turned away the ecstasy of Jacob. You know,  
16 God's people, they don't look too good, do they, as  
17 the excellency of Israel, for the emptiers have  
18 emptied them out, and marred their vine branches.

19 The shield of the mighty men is made red.  
20 You know, people use shields, don't they?

21 JIM: Uh-hum.

22 DAVID: And the valiant men are in scarlet.  
23 So, you know, people got hurt the other day, didn't  
24 they?

25 JIM: Uh-huh. Uh-huh.

1                   DAVID: Now, it says something funny here  
2 about these certain chariots that these men will be  
3 riding in.

4                   JIM: Uh-huh.

5                   DAVID: It says the chariots shall be with  
6 flaming torches. Flaming torches? What's that?

7                   JIM: Well, what is that?

8                   DAVID: Huh. In the day of his preparation,  
9 the fir trees shall be terribly shaken. Hum. I  
10 guess, I guess that's what their knocking over out  
11 here across the property, there are fir trees, huh?

12                   It says the chariots shall rage in the  
13 streets, they shall jostle one against another in the  
14 broad ways, they shall seem like torches, they shall  
15 run like the lightnings. These things can go pretty  
16 fast, can't they? Huh?

17                   JIM: I don't know, David, I've never been  
18 in one.

19                   DAVID: Well, the thing of it is is that  
20 these flaming torches are guns, you know that?

21                   JIM: Oh, I see.

22                   DAVID: The prophet is trying to explain to  
23 you when these prophecies meet their fulfillment when  
24 they fight against the Lord. Now, what happens is the  
25 belligerent power kind of loses one round, a simple

1 round, but then it says, he shall recount his  
2 worthies, you know. They reorganize.

3 JIM: uh-huh.

4 DAVID: But they shall stumble in their  
5 walk, they shall make haste to the wall thereof, and  
6 the defence shall be prepared.

7 And then it goes, the gates of the rivers  
8 shall be opened, and the palace shall be dissolved.

9 And Huzzab shall be led away captive. Now,  
10 I know you don't realize what this is talking about,  
11 but Huzzab means that which is established. And she  
12 shall be brought up, and her maids shall lead her with  
13 her voice of doves, tabering upon their breasts.

14 But Ninevah is of old like a pool of water,  
15 stale, stagnate. Yet they shall flee away. Stand,  
16 stand, shall they cry, but none shall look back.

17 What happens? How come this power who seems  
18 to be so well outfitted with jostling chariots and  
19 flaming torches and all that, that can make trees  
20 shake, how come all of a sudden they end up having to  
21 run for.

22 And then all of a sudden it says, take ye  
23 the spoil of silver, take the spoil of gold. There is  
24 no end to their store and the glory out of the  
25 pleasant furniture.

1                   She is empty, and void, and waste, and the  
2 heart melteth, and all knees smite together. Who's  
3 scared now? Much pain is in all loins, and all faces  
4 of them gather blackness.

5                   I mean these guys must be really terrified.  
6 What happens?

7                   Where is the dwelling of the lions and the  
8 feeding place of the young lions. You know, these,  
9 these, these, people, wicked people, they thought  
10 they're tough, didn't they? You know, how people have  
11 this lion character and all that?

12                  JIM: Uh-huh.

13                  DAVID: Where is the lion, even the old lion  
14 that walked, and the lion's whelp, and none made them  
15 afraid?

16                  The lion did tear in pieces enough for his  
17 whelps, and strangled for his lionesses. I mean isn't  
18 that what most people do, is provide for their  
19 families?

20                  JIM: Uh-huh.

21                  DAVID: Isn't it?

22                  JIM: Uh-huh.

23                  DAVID: Filled his holes with prey, and his  
24 dens with ravin. Huh. See, God uses symbols  
25 sometimes to reveal natures of men. What does God say

1 about these people with flaming torches?

2 Behold, I am against thee, saith the Lord of  
3 hosts. Remember the father in heaven?

4 JIM: Uh-huh.

5 DAVID: And I will burn her chariots in the  
6 smoke, and the sword shall devour the young lions.  
7 You know, these big tough guys. And I will cut off  
8 thy prey from off the earth, and the voice of my  
9 messenger shall be heard -- no more be heard.

10 Woe to the bloody city. It is full of lies  
11 and robbery and the prey departeth not.

12 Noise of a whip, and the noise of the  
13 rattling of the wheels, prancing horses, and of the  
14 jumping chariots.

15 The horseman lifteth up both the bright  
16 sword and the glittering spear. You know, what, what,  
17 what is all this? You know, these prophecies don't  
18 make much sense, do they?

19 JIM: Well, I'm trying to understand. Go  
20 ahead.

21 DAVID: The great number of carcasses. There  
22 is a number, a multitude of slain, and a great number  
23 of carcasses, and there is no end of their corpses,  
24 they stumble upon their corpses. Why, why do these  
25 people lose for?

1                   Because of the multitude of the whoredoms of  
2 the well favoured harlot, the mistress of witchcrafts,  
3 that sell nations through her whoredoms and families  
4 through her witchcraft.

5                   Have you ever heard of Babylon the Great?

6                   JIM: Uh-huh.

7                   DAVID: Yeah, that's what this prophecy is  
8 talking about.

9                   Behold, I am against thee, saith the Lord of  
10 hosts, and I will discover thy skirts upon my face,  
11 and I will show the nations thy nakedness and the  
12 kingdoms thy shame.

13                   You know, there's no nation that's been  
14 given greater privileges than the United States of  
15 America. It's supposed to protect its people. It's  
16 supposed to have an ear to listen and to learn. It's  
17 supposed to have freedoms to be able to know the word  
18 of God and what God states. You know, In God We  
19 Trust, it says on the currency, doesn't it?

20                   JIM: Yeah.

21                   DAVID: But if they don't really know what  
22 God states, they're going to misunderstand.

23                   And I will cast abominable filth upon thee  
24 and make thee vile, and I will set thee as a gazing  
25 stock.

1                   And it shall come to pass, that all they  
2 that look upon thee shall flee from thee, and say,  
3 Nineveh is laid waste, who will bemoan her? Whence  
4 shall I seek comforters for thee?

5                   Art thou better than populous No. No was an  
6 ancient city.

7                   JIM: Uh-huh.

8                   DAVID: Populous means it's just highly  
9 populated.

10                  JIM: Uh-huh.

11                  DAVID: This place was situated among the  
12 rivers, that had the waters round about it, whose  
13 rampart was the sea, and her wall was from the sea.  
14 You know, it was really highly fortified.

15                  JIM: Uh-huh.

16                  DAVID: Ethiopia and Egypt were her  
17 strength. They were their allies. And it was  
18 infinite. Put and Lubim were thy helpers. But what  
19 happened?

20                  Yet was she carried away and went into  
21 captivity. Her young children were also dashed in  
22 pieces at the top of all the streets and they cast  
23 lots upon the honourable men and all her great men  
24 were bound in chains.

25                  So, you know, a lot of empires think they're

1 really tough, don't they?

2 But it says here, by Nineveh, it says, thou  
3 also shall be drunken. You know, they're out of their  
4 minds.

5 JIM: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: Thou shall be hid, thou also shall  
7 seek strength because of the enemy.

8 Do you know who the enemy is? God. They  
9 make God their enemy.

10 JIM: Huh.

11 DAVID: All thy strongholds shall be like  
12 fig trees with the first ripe figs, if they be shaken,  
13 shall even fall into the mouth of the eater.

14 That's easy, isn't it, to knock all their  
15 power out, huh?

16 Behold, thy people in the midst of thee are  
17 women, and the gates of thy land shall be set wide  
18 open unto thine enemies, the fire shall devour thy  
19 bars.

20 You know who brings that fire, don't you?  
21 God does. Remember in Psalms 18 where it talked about  
22 Messiah saying that his enemies were too strong for  
23 him?

24 JIM: Uh-huh, yeah.

25 DAVID: They start -- they, they, they



1 destroy him. And it says that they prevented me the  
2 day of my calamity. And it says, the heavens depart  
3 and God comes down and hits them with fire and  
4 brimstone.

5 JIM: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: But that's not the end of the world,  
7 though. It takes place before the end of the world.

8 Draw thee waters for the siege, fortify thy  
9 strongholds, go into the clay and tread the mortar,  
10 make strong thy brickklin.

11 There shall the fire devour thee, the sword  
12 shall cut thee off. It shall eat thee up like the  
13 cankerworm, make thyself many as the cankerworm, make  
14 thyself many as the locusts.

15 In other words, you know, it's kind of like,  
16 oh, they can multiply as much as they want to, right?

17 JIM: Uh-huh.

18 DAVID: This, this harlot here, it says,  
19 thou hast multiplied thy merchants above the stars of  
20 heaven. Hum. These, these people got so much --  
21 don't they? The cankerworm spoileth and fleeth away.

22 Thy crowned are as the locusts, and thy  
23 captains as the grasshoppers. There's too many people  
24 in charge, isn't there? A lot of leaders in this  
25 country, huh?

1                   JIM: Uh-huh.

2                   DAVID: Called Ninevah in prophecy. Which  
3 camp in the hedges in the cold day. I mean, you know,  
4 they're, they're all out there in the fields and  
5 everything. They're all out there hiding and creeping  
6 down behind the bushes, right, trying to stay warm.

7 But when the sun ariseth.

8                   You ever heard of the day spring, Jim?

9                   JIM: Uh-huh.

10                  DAVID: Peter says prophecy will be a light  
11 that shines in a dark place until the day dawn and a  
12 day spring arise in your heart. Not unless you know  
13 the mystery of the God, that God declared to service  
14 the prophets, will you understand these mysteries.

15                  Yet when the sun ariseth, they shall flee  
16 away and their place is not known where they are.

17                  Thy shepherds slumber, O king of Assyria.  
18 You think all these preachers and teachers of this  
19 country can show you the Seven Seals? Uh-uh. They're  
20 sleeping.

21                  And thy nobles shall dwell in the dust, thy  
22 people are scattered upon the mountains and no man  
23 gathereth them.

24                  There is no healing for thy bruise, thy  
25 wound is grievous. All that hear the bruit of thee

1 shall clap the hands over thee, for upon whom hath not  
2 thy wickedness passed continually?

3           You know, a person read a prophecy like this  
4 and they say to me, they say, Dave, I don't understand  
5 that prophecy. Well, naturally, because, first of  
6 all, we have to figure out how this is good news. You  
7 know, people always talk about the Gospel, Jesus'  
8 good news, right?

8           JIM: Uh-huh.

9           DAVID: And they emphasize and magnify one  
10 point. But on the other hand, they deny that the good  
11 news is that if we are with God, God is the one that  
12 finishes the battle. If we are not with the God  
13 that's foretold this things, then we're the ones who  
14 end up being destroyed. All the prophets talk about  
15 an event in latter days where someone is to bring good  
16 tidings to publish his peace. But that peace and  
17 those good tidings are found in one book, the  
18 Revelation of Jesus Christ -- of the time when Christ  
19 will return again.

18           Now, who are this heathen that rage? Who  
19 are the ones that bring the jostling chariots with  
20 flaming torches? Who are they? Well, we know they're  
21 not God's people, right? They're the people of the  
22 world, the people that know not God. Okay.

1 reading it is the one that's informed on it, right?

2 JIM: Right, uh-huh.

3 DAVID: And what does God say, keep the  
4 what? Munition.

5 JIM: Right.

6 DAVID: Watch the way. Fortify that power  
7 how?

8 JIM: Uh-huh.

9 DAVID: Mightily.

10 JIM: Mightily, uh-huh.

11 DAVID: Now, how does the Lord turn away the  
12 ecstasy of Jacob? Well, when you see Jacob, -- when  
13 you see God's people, they don't look too hot, do  
14 they? No. You see, because the emptiers have emptied  
15 them out and marred out their vine branches. I mean,  
16 you know, been terrible, terrible thing. These people  
17 look bad, don't they?

18 The shield of the mighty men is made red,  
19 the valiant men are in scarlet. The chariots shall be  
20 with flaming torches. I mean, you know, bang, bang,  
21 bang. In the presence of his preparation. The fir  
22 trees be mind, terribly shaken. I mean, you know,  
23 don't you think a tank can make a big boom?

24 JIM: Yeah, but it would have to have a gun  
25 on it, though. We don't have guns on those.

1                   DAVID: What are those things sticking out  
2 the front, Jim? Are you sure you're getting complete  
3 communication with these guys?

4                   JIM: I'll tell you what, I'll double check.

5                   DAVID: Okay.

6                   JIM: Okay. Go ahead.

7                   DAVID: The chariots shall rage in the  
8 streets, they shall jostle one against another in the  
9 broad ways. That's what they sound like. You see, the  
10 prophet can only tell you what he saw. He'd never  
11 seen one of these things in his days. He can only  
12 explain it, you know, from the way he saw it in his  
13 day. They seem like torches. They shall -- I mean  
14 they look like -- I mean they're not really torches  
15 with fire but they have a fire that comes out of them,  
16 don't they?

17                   JIM: Yeah, uh-huh.

18                   DAVID: They shall run like the -- they're  
19 fast.

20                   JIM: Uh-huh.

21                   DAVID: You know, like the prophet is trying  
22 to tell you, he said like this is what I saw in  
23 vision.           He shall recount his worthies. In  
24 other words, you have to sometimes gather up your men.  
25 And it says, they shall stumble in their walk. What

1 happens? Generally, when people stumble in their  
2 walk, it means they kind of fall, don't it?

3 JIM: Uh-huh.

4 DAVID: Oh, Jim. Like I say, I usually give  
5 -- people say that don't want to hear me, they say I  
6 brainwash, but I give, I give two weeks of study to  
7 most of my students, just to get them familiar with  
8 the prophetic terminologies.

8 JIM: Uh-huh.

9 DAVID: And there are prophecies that are  
10 very, very clear to understand which did not give as  
11 thorough detail. There are prophecies that, that do  
12 not give as much detail but, but the keynote of all of  
13 this is that when there's time no longer, there's a  
14 mystery of God, something God has hid, that's to be  
15 finished. I mean there's something God's going to do,  
16 right?

16 JIM: Uh-huh.

17 DAVID: Right?

18 JIM: Uh-Huh.

19 DAVID: And he declared it to who? Well,  
20 you know, the next book over there is Habakkuk, right?

20 JIM: Uh-huh.

21 DAVID: Then it says, it says right here, it  
22 says the prophet sees, in Verse 2, he says, Lord, how

23

1 long will I cry, and thou wilt not hear even crying to  
2 thee of what?

3 JIM: Violence.

4 DAVID: And thou wilt not what?

5 JIM: Save.

6 DAVID: Why dost thou shew me iniquity, and  
7 cause me to behold grievance? For spoiling and  
8 violence are before me. I mean this, this sounds --  
9 this is violence, you know. The prophet sees a  
10 terrible event, don't he?

11 JIM: Uh-huh.

12 DAVID: For there are that rise up strife  
13 and what? Contention.

14 JIM: Uh-huh.

15 DAVID: I mean there's some people involved  
16 in this prophecy that are given some real hell, aren't  
17 there?

18 JIM: Uh-huh.

19 DAVID: Therefore the law is what? Slacked.  
20 And judgment doth never go forth, for the wicked doth  
21 compass about the what?

22 JIM: Righteous.

23 DAVID: So, the righteous are in one  
24 situation. Who's gathering around them? The wicked.

25 JIM: Uh-huh.



1                   DAVID: Now, the people on the outside that  
2 are watching this, they're being, you know, -- the  
3 good guys are on the inside. The bad guys are  
4 gathered around them, and the people around them,  
5 which are the -- of the world, they're judging this.  
6 And it says, therefore wrong judgment proceedeth,  
7 right?

8                   JIM: Uh-huh.

9                   DAVID: Huh. It's kind of like we're on the  
10 inside, you boys are on the outside, you know, and  
11 everyone else is beyond you all. They're, they're  
12 having to -- trying to figure out what's going on,  
13 don't they?

14                   Behold ye among the heathen and regard and  
15 wonder marvelously. Yeah, see, you don't know what's  
16 going on, Jim. You're wondering what this is all  
17 about, aren't you?

18                   For I will work a work in your days, which  
19 you will not believe, though it be told you.

20                   Now, what's this all about?

21                   For I raise up the Chaldeans, that bitter  
22 and hasty nation. Hasty, oh, boy, they move quick.  
23 Who are the Chaldeans? Ancient Babylon. Let me tell  
24 you about the Chaldeans. It's the same spirit that  
25 was --remember that image, the well favoured harlot?

1 JIM: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: The world and the spirit thereof?

3 JIM: Uh-huh.

4 DAVID: Huh. Well, you see, if God punishes  
5 a man for being a certain way 5000 years ago, he'll  
6 punish a man today for being the same way. So, you  
7 just transfer the same spirit.

8 JIM: Hum.

9 DAVID: But in the days of the -- that's  
10 when Babylon is going to fall -- revelation, Babylon  
11 the Great, the real harlot. That's why the image is -  
12 - see, it brings the fall of the real Babylon.

13 Anyway, it says, they shall march through  
14 the breadth of the land, to possess the dwellings that  
15 are not their's.

16 They are terrible and dreadful. Their  
17 judgment and their dignity shall proceed of  
18 themselves.

19 You think these people fear God? Do you  
20 think they judge after God's judgment? Do you think  
21 they care about God's judgment, the Book? Do you  
22 think they care about the one who brings that Book?  
23 Do you?

24 JIM: No.

25 DAVID: No, they don't. They don't know

1 nothing about it, do they?

2 JIM: Uh-huh.

3 DAVID: They're supposed to wonder, aren't  
4 they? Now, it says, their horses are swifter than  
5 leopards. Now, these aren't real horses. Now,  
6 remember, the prophet is trying to explain to you  
7 something, right?

7 JIM: Uh-huh.

8 DAVID: And he's never seen any of these  
9 things before, has he?

10 JIM: Right.

11 DAVID: I mean he sees men -- he recognizes  
12 men. He sees men traveling and things but I mean like  
13 their moving with great speed. In the days of  
14 Habakkuk, they were using horses, mules, things like  
15 that, right?

15 JIM: Uh-huh.

16 DAVID: But he says, their horses are  
17 swifter than leopards. I mean leopards are fast. And  
18 are more fierce than the evening wolves. Now, horses  
19 aren't fierce.

19 JIM: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: But it depends on if we're talking  
21 about some kind of vehicle that's dangerous.

22 JIM: Uh-huh.

23

24

25

1                   DAVID: And their horsemen shall spread  
2 themselves and their horsemen shall come from far and  
3 they shall fly as the eagle that hasteth to eat.

4                   They all come for what reason?

5                   JIM: Uh-huh.

6                   DAVID: Violence. Their faces shall sup up  
7 as the east wind, and they shall gather the captivity  
8 as the sand.

9                   They scoff at the kings. The princes are a  
10 scorning to them. They shall deride every strong  
11 hold. They shall heap up dust and take it.

12                   Then shall his mind change, and he shall  
13 pass over and offend. Who does he end up offending?  
14 This big tough person here offends God because he  
15 thinks that his God has power to offend the God he's  
16 offended.

17                   Imputing this his power unto his God.

18                   Well, what happens, I wonder. Let's see  
19 here. The prophet says, art thou not from  
20 everlasting, O Lord my God, mine Holy One? We shall  
21 not die. O Lord, thou has ordained them for what?  
22 Judgment.

23                   JIM: Uh-huh.

24                   DAVID: O mighty God, thou hast established  
25 them for what? They're fixing to get what?

1 JIM: Correction.

2 DAVID: A big whooping from who? From God,  
3 right?

4 JIM: Right, uh-huh.

5 DAVID: Thou art of purer eyes than to  
6 behold evil, and canst not look on iniquity, wherefore  
7 look or why do you look upon them that deal  
8 treacherously, and holdest thy tongue when the wicked  
9 devoureth the man that is more righteous than he?

10 Wonder who this man he is. Huh. It seems  
11 like one group is devouring this one guy, huh?

12 JIM: Uh-huh.

13 DAVID: And he's more righteous than they,  
14 right?

15 JIM: Uh-huh.

16 DAVID: You know, there's nothing more  
17 righteous than the truth that God sits on the throne  
18 and that's your father, Jim, do you know that?

19 JIM: Yes, uh-huh.

20 DAVID: And your father gave the lamb, your  
21 brother, a book with Seven Seals.

22 JIM: Uh-huh.

23 DAVID: Right?

24 JIM: Right.

25 DAVID: And he's going to come in latter

1 days. And the only way you'll know him is if he can  
2 show you the seals out of the book, right?

3 JIM: Uh-huh.

4 DAVID: Anyway, the prophet complains that  
5 God has allowed it to where he makes men as the fishes  
6 of the sea, and as the creeping things -- there's a  
7 lot of them, isn't there?

8 JIM: Uh-huh.

9 DAVID: That have no ruler over -- they all  
10 do their own thing, right?

11 JIM: Right.

12 DAVID: They take up all of them with the  
13 angle and they catch them in their net, and gather  
14 them in their drag. Therefore, they rejoice and are  
15 glad.

16 He says the nature of men is kind of like  
17 everyone's got like a hook for everybody else, right?

18 JIM: Right. Wait, show me where you are.  
19 I, I lost --

20 DAVID: The verse is 15.

21 JIM: Okay, yeah, I got it.

22 DAVID: He talks about, you know, about  
23 Verse 14 --

24 JIM: Right.

25 DAVID: -- makes men as, you know, --

1                   JIM: Fishes of the sea.

2                   DAVID: And everyone is out to get something  
3 from somebody else, right?

4                   JIM: Right, uh-huh.

5                   DAVID: And they're all with a fishing hook  
6 and an angle. That's what an angler lure is, you  
7 know, he's got a fishing hook and a drag is a net.

8                   JIM: Uh-huh.

9                   DAVID: Therefore, they rejoice and they're  
10 glad cause they get, they get gain from this.  
11 Therefore, they sacrifice unto their net and burn  
12 incense unto their drag. Because by them, by these  
13 tools, they're portion is fat. In other words, they  
14 get rich, don't they?

15                   JIM: Uh-huh.

16                   DAVID: And their meat plenteous. It's kind  
17 of like today, you know, when you're going to high  
18 school. You buy your nice new car, right?

19                   JIM: Right.

20                   DAVID: Why? So, you can get nice pretty  
21 girls, right?

22                   JIM: Uh-huh.

23                   DAVID: So, you'll sacrifice for things that  
24 you want to get other things.

25                   Shall they therefore empty their net and not

1 spare continually to slay the nations?

2           You see, God contends that Babylon -- that  
3 the merchants are the -- of the earth.

4           JIM: Uh-huh.

5           DAVID: Can buy their sorceries nations of  
6 deceit. In other words, always trying to get, get,  
7 get, get, get, get. They don't have time to think  
8 about what really is at hand.

9           Well, the prophet of Hababbuk says, I will  
10 stand upon my watch. So, you know, supposed to way  
11 the way, Nahum says, right?

12           JIM: Uh-huh.

13           DAVID: And set me upon the tower, and will  
14 watch to see what he will say unto me, that is this  
15 belligerent power, the Chaldeans, the Babylonians, and  
16 what I shall answer when I am reproved.

17           Because, you know, these people, their  
18 dignity proceeds from themselves. They're big shots.  
19 They're of the world. They don't nothing about God or  
20 his seals. So, you know, the prophet says that he's  
21 going to probably be reproved by them.

22           The Lord answered me, and said, write the  
23 vision and make it plain upon tables. Why? That he  
24 may run that what? Readeth it.

25           JIM: Uh-huh.



1                   DAVID: In other words, for instance, if you  
2 really understood these prophecies and all these, you  
3 know, young men and stuff driving around in all these  
4 little buggies around here, you know, with those  
5 flaming torches and stuff, if this country really knew  
6 what was fixing to happen, they would run.

7                   JIM: Uh-huh.

8                   DAVID: For the vision is yet for an  
9 appointed time, but at the end it shall speak and not  
10 lie. So, we're here.

11                  JIM: Uh-huh.

12                  DAVID: Though it tarry, wait for it because  
13 it will surely come. It will not tarry.

14                  JIM: What, what will happen?

15                  DAVID: Well, let's find out. This is to  
16 bring down the pride of the last nation that's apart.  
17 You see, God is going to resurrect all the men that  
18 have ever lived on the face of the earth. You know  
19 that, don't you?

20                  JIM: Uh-huh.

21                  DAVID: And those who neglected to take heed  
22 to God's warnings through our prophecy, have in their  
23 day been able to live their lives with no retribution  
24 from God.

25                  JIM: Uh-huh.

1                   DAVID: But their sins are still marked  
2 against their name.

3                   JIM: Uh-huh.

4                   DAVID: So, God, likes to take the wicked  
5 and their pride so that when they are resurrected,  
6 guess who they get to face? The one that came to save  
7 him is the one that's going to destroy him.

8                   JIM: Uh-huh.

9                   DAVID: Wickedness will not rise up in the  
10 second time. No more affliction this time. Okay,  
11 now, here's the key.

12                   Behold, his soul which is lifted up is not  
13 upright in him.

14                   The proud and the arrogant, those who are  
15 always just doing something for their personal gain  
16 and not -- are looking to God and to his word and to  
17 this throne, they are going to be punished.

18                   But the just shall live by his what? Faith.

19                   Now, my faith is in God who sits on a  
20 throne. And my father gave me Seven Seals. Now, I do  
21 everything that I can to try to teach them in these  
22 Seven Seals.

23                   But there are other people in the world --  
24 yes, also, because he transgresseth by wine. He is a  
25 proud man, neither keepeth at home, who enlargeth his

1 desire as hell and is as death and cannot be satisfied  
2 but gathereth unto him all nations -- he would -- all  
3 people.

4           You know, you know who the real prince in  
5 this world is? Satan. That's what Isaiah 14 tells  
6 you.

7           JIM: Uh-huh.

8           DAVID: And you know how Satan rules the  
9 world? Through men. What did Satan promise Christ if  
10 Christ would worship him? Promised him the kingdoms,  
11 didn't he?

12           JIM: Uh-huh.

13           DAVID: Promised him authority. Promised  
14 him power, right?

15           JIM: Uh-huh.

16           DAVID: And Satan does this to all men.  
17 These people are considered in the scripture as drunk.  
18 They're out of their minds. Because, you see,  
19 transgressing God's law and denying God's offers of  
20 mercy is worst than anything a man could ever do  
21 because God's above Satan.

22           Shall not all these take up a parable  
23 against him and a taunting proverb against him and  
24 say, woe to him that increaseth that which is not his.  
25 How long and to him that ladeth himself with thick

1 clay.

2           These people make themselves little idols,  
3 don't they?

4           Shall they not rise up suddenly that shall  
5 bite thee.

6           Now, on the front of our property out here,  
7 there's a flag. Have you heard about it yet?

8           JIM: Yeah, uh-huh.

9           DAVID: Okay. Now, on that flag, there's a  
10 star of David and there's a silver serpent. There's  
11 Seven Seals there. There's a snake there.

12           It says here, shall they not rise up  
13 suddenly that shall bite thee.

14           Remember when the children of Israel were  
15 doing wrong, how that serpents were sent throughout  
16 the camp and bit them?

17           JIM: Uh-huh.

18           DAVID: Remember that story?

19           JIM: Yeah, uh-huh.

20           DAVID: Okay. That Moses was told to raise  
21 up our brazen serpent --

22           JIM: Uh-huh.

23           DAVID: -- and he held him. Okay. So,  
24 Christ is that snake, isn't he?

25           JIM: Uh-huh.

1                   DAVID: Well, in Isaiah 14, God says, for  
2 the heathen not to rejoice because he's going to bring  
3 forth a cockatrice, which is a snake. And his fruit  
4 shall be a fire flying serpent, which talks about  
5 little children.

6                   Now, it says here that there are those that  
7 want to step on property that's not their's, right.

8                   JIM: Uh-huh.

9                   DAVID: They want to increase that which is  
10 not theirs. How long? And it says, shall they not  
11 rise up suddenly that shall bite thee and awake that  
12 shall vex thee, and thou shall become booties unto  
13 them. Just like Nahum says. Nahum says that finally  
14 what happens is this belligerent power of the world  
15 finally steps on somebody's toes that they shouldn't  
16 step on. God's given them the whole world. He's  
17 given them all the power and glory that man could  
18 afford unto them. But, finally, there's one little  
19 group, one little remnant, and all they do is talk  
20 about Seven Seals, which is the knowledge of the  
21 authority of the heavens, you know.

22                   JIM: Right.

23                   DAVID: And it says that the heathen will  
24 regard and they'll wonder. They won't know what's  
25 going on. The prophets say the heathen will not

1 understand. Daniel foretold the same event in the  
2 latter days. Daniel says, and there's a small  
3 remnant. Daniel says, the wicked will be doing  
4 wickedly and none of the wicked will understand but  
5 the righteous, they shall understand.

6 Now, it says here, thou shall become booties  
7 unto them.

8 In other words, everything in this great  
9 empire becomes the possessions of somebody else.

10 It says here, because thou hast spoiled many  
11 nations, all the remnant of the people shall spoil you  
12 because of men's blood and for the violence of the  
13 land, of the city, and of all that dwell therein.

14 Woe to him that coveteth an evil  
15 covetousness to his house, that he may set his nest on  
16 high, that he may be delivered from the power of evil.

17 Thou has consulted shame to thy house by  
18 cutting off many people. Thou has sinned against thy  
19 soul.

20 Man, that's terrible, isn't it?

21 JIM: Uh-huh.

22 DAVID: To think that this person involved  
23 here has cut off people and sinned against his own  
24 soul.

25 For the stone shall cry out of the wall and

1 the beam out of the timber shall answer it.

2 Now, what does that mean? Anyway, here's  
3 the key verse, Verse 13.

4 JIM: Right.

5 DAVID: Behold, is it not of the Lord of  
6 hosts that the people shall labour in the very fire.

7 Well, is God in charge of the situation?

8 JIM: Uh-huh.

9 DAVID: Whatever it is?

10 JIM: Uh-huh.

11 DAVID: And the people shall weary  
12 themselves for vanity.

13 JIM: Uh-huh.

14 DAVID: For the earth shall be filled with  
15 the knowledge of the what? See Verse 14?

16 JIM: Of the glory.

17 DAVID: Of the Lord as the waters cover the  
18 what?

19 JIM: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: Ohhhhhhh.

21 JIM: You okay?

22 DAVID: Yeah, I'm all right. So, anyway,  
23 the way you understand or the first part to be able to  
24 understand every detail of these prophecies, Jim, --

25 JIM: Okay.

1                   DAVID: -- is when you get over here to  
2 Verses 20, and it tells you, but the Lord is where?

3                   JIM: In his holy temple.

4                   DAVID: Where's that at?

5                   JIM: That must be heaven.

6                   DAVID: Yep. Let all the earth what? Keep  
7 silence before him, right?

8                   JIM: Right.

9                   DAVID: So, you see, ignorance is something  
10 highly considered in the judgment, highly considered  
11 in the judiciary of heaven.

12                   JIM: Uh-huh.

13                   DAVID: And we do understand like Habakkuk  
14 says. It says, you know, the God will work a work in  
15 the days of the heathen which they will not believe --
