



## **Addendum to Undergraduate Catalog 1984-86 Southwest Texas State University San Marcos, Texas**

This update of Southwest Texas State University's undergraduate catalog contains changes in pertinent information relating to degree requirements and course offerings at SWT.

Additional academic information is available from the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Offices of the School Deans, and the individual academic departments.

This update was prepared on the basis of the best information available at the time of printing. All information—including fees, course offerings, and admission and graduation requirements—is subject to change without notice or obligation.

**HANDICAPPED STUDENTS — Page 10.** Change the first line of the first paragraph to read: Handicapped students, including hearing impaired students and students with learning disabilities, may be eligible for auxiliary aids provided by the University.

**Change** the first sentence of the second paragraph to read: To obtain permission to park in special parking zones set aside for the handicapped, a student should obtain a note of handicapped status and length of time needed from the Student Health Center. ("Personal Physician" deleted from sentence.)

**THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY — Page 11.** Add "coin-operated typewriters" to the last line of the fifth paragraph.

## **ADMISSIONS**

**Page 14. Transfer Admission Requirements. Delete** item 3, and **change** number 4 to number 3. **Add** new number 4: New transfer students with two or more documented suspensions will be referred to the Academic Dean of the student's major. The Dean will then submit a memo to the Director of Admissions indicating the decision to admit or deny admission. Admissions will then forward the appropriate correspondence to the applicant. The Academic Dean will monitor the progress of accepted students.

**Page 16. Maximum Hours Accepted. Delete** paragraph in catalog. **Replace** with following: SWT will apply to a specific degree no more than 66 hours from an accredited junior college/community college (at the approval of the individual Dean, 6-8 hours may be added). At the time of the transfer, all transferrable work attempted at a junior college/community college will be recorded on the official transcript. If the number of hours transferred from a junior college exceeds 66, it will be the responsibility of the department chair to recommend to the academic Dean how the student will satisfy degree requirements.

**Page 18. Foreign Credentials. Change** the last sentence: A non-refundable \$50.00 admissions/evaluation fee (U.S. currency) will be charged to: (1) all non-citizens, and (2) U.S. citizens considered for admission on the basis of foreign credentials.

**Page 19. NOTES. Change Note 1.** For students wishing to enroll in upper-level division business courses, see School of Business Note, page 112, for entrance requirements.

**STEP 4. Verification of High School Rank. Change** third sentence of first paragraph: Before academic acceptance is granted, this form must be completed and returned or a high school transcript sent by a high school counselor or registrar verifying high school rank.

**Page 20. STEP 7. Visiting SWT. Weekend Visitors. Change:** Although university offices are closed on weekends, a Visitor's Center is open (except during holiday periods) and visitors are welcome. Visitors on weekends should report to the Information Center, 1st floor (Roanoke Street entrance) of the LBJ Memorial Student Center for a campus tour and to secure prospective student material.

## **RESIDENTIAL LIVING**

**Page 22. Following Cancellation Dates, add:** Beginning the fall of 1986, the \$50.00 deposit will increase to \$100.00. Currently, a proposal is being reviewed for a \$150.00 prepayment of room and board fees in addition to the deposit. This would be non-refundable upon failure to cancel by a designated date.

Also, a monthly payment option for room and board is being considered to begin in the fall of 1986.

**TELEPHONES.** Beginning the fall of 1985, students will need to bring their own telephones in order to use phone service in a residence hall. Residential Living will provide local service free of charge; however, students wishing to have long distance service must sign a contract with the local telephone company.

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

**Page 23. Change** dates in first sentence, first paragraph: For Fall 1985, use the 1984 Income Tax Return. **Change** both dates in second paragraph to 1984.

**Page 24. Delete** final three paragraphs on page, starting with sentence, "Students obtaining aid from federally and state funded programs must be making satisfactory academic progress toward a degree program." **Replace** with the following:

### SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Undergraduate Students: Students obtaining aid from any federally or state funded program must be making satisfactory academic progress toward a degree or certificate. For the purposes of awarding financial aid only, satisfactory academic progress will be determined after an undergraduate student has been enrolled for two long semesters and every semester thereafter. In addition to meeting the satisfactory academic progress requirements outlined below, all students must also meet the specific financial aid program eligibility requirements. These satisfactory academic progress requirements apply regardless of whether or not financial aid was received. An undergraduate student is considered to be making satisfactory academic progress if the following conditions are met:

1. A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 is maintained on all work attempted at SWT. The most recent grade received in a course is used in calculation of GPA when courses are repeated. An "I" grade will be a non-punitive grade for one year from the end of the semester in which the "I" grade is received and will not be counted in calculation of GPA. If an "I" grade is not removed within the one-year period, it will become an "F" grade and will be counted in calculation of GPA. Grades of "W", "P", "X", and "CR" are also non-punitive grades and will not be counted in calculation of GPA.

2. A student must have satisfactorily completed an average of 12 semester hours (excluding repeats) over all long semesters enrolled at Southwest Texas State University regardless of whether or not financial aid was received. Courses which are repeated are counted only once. A course in which an "I" grade is received is not counted as hours completed in calculating average hours, until such time as the "I" grade has been removed. Those students who withdraw from the University prior to mid-semester will not be charged with a semester in calculating average hours. The semester will be counted where withdrawal occurs after mid-semester.

3. An undergraduate student enrolled in an eligible program leading to the first baccalaureate degree has five (5) academic years (August to August) consisting of 10 long semesters and 10 summer sessions, including time enrolled in another college or university, to complete the degree requirements.

4. An undergraduate student working toward a second baccalaureate degree will normally have one academic year (August to August) consisting of two long semesters and two summer sessions to complete the degree requirements.

5. A student who has been less than a full-time student (12 hours per long semester) for reasons of full-time employment, illness, or other circumstances, prior to the semester for which aid is desired, when properly documented, shall be considered to be making satisfactory academic progress if he/she has a minimum overall SWT GPA of at least 2.0, and enrolls for and completes a minimum of 12 semester hours each long semester from that semester forward.

6. Summer sessions completed at SWT are considered "make-up time" and are not counted as semesters in calculating average hours. For example, a student who completes 9 hours each long semester and 6 hours in a summer term would calculate his average load by dividing the total (24 hours) by the number of long semesters (2) for an average of 12 hours.

Students whose aid has been terminated are not eligible to receive aid while making up deficiencies for either overall Grade Point Average or hours unless it can be documented by the student that there were extenuating circumstances that caused or contributed to the deficiency. Students are encouraged to attend summer school prior to the next long semester for which they will be enrolled.

**Page 30. Short-Term and Emergency Loans.** Change eligibility statement: Enrolled at least half-time. SWT GPA at least 2.0. Attendance at SWT at least one prior semester. No holds on records. Not defaulted on a previous short-term loan.

**Page 31. Correct name of scholarship: Emmie Craddock Scholarship.**

**State Scholarship Program for Ethnic Recruitment:** Under eligibility, third sentence: delete "the school's" and add "SWT's".

**Page 32. Presidential Upper-Level Scholarships. Add:** Deadline — February 15.

**Louise Lindsey Merrick Scholarship. Add:** Deadline — January 15.

**President's Scholars.** Under "Eligibility", change ACT score to 24 and SAT score to 1000. Change statement under "How to Apply": Applications through Office of Student Financial Aid. Deadline — January 15.

**Add Program: Army ROTC 2 & 3 Year Scholarships.** Eligibility: Must be a full-time student with a GPA of 2.5 or above; must be a US citizen; must be medically qualified — the physical is paid for by the ROTC department. Value: \$1,000 annually, plus full tuition, laboratory and incidental fees; an allowance for books and necessary supplies. How to apply: Application through the Professor of Military Science, Department of Military Science. Deadlines to be announced.

**CORRESPONDENCE STUDY — Page 58. Fees.** Effective September 1, 1985, the registration fee for a correspondence course is \$100.00.

**MINOR REQUIREMENTS (NO CERTIFICATE) — Page 63. Add** three minors.

**Women's Studies.** 18 semester hours, including Sociology 3376A and 3376B<sup>1</sup> plus 12 hours from the following: Anthropology 3350, 3370; Psychology 3332; Sociology 3327, 337C; Communication 3318C; English 3340; Education 4378C; and Political Science 4331.

**Writing.** 24 semester hours, including English 1310, 1320; one of the following: 2310, 2320, 2330, 2340, 2370, 2380; 2351 or 2384; 3311; 3314 or 3315; 3340; one advanced literature elective (excluding 3385 and 3386).

**Change** the last paragraph: There are several other course requirements which vary according to the pharmacy school. Therefore, consultation with the adviser is strongly recommended both prior to and during the program.

**Add: TRANSFER HOURS FROM TWO-YEAR COLLEGES.** No more than 21 hours in criminal justice may be transferred to SWT from a two-year college. **3212 Resident Rehabilitation and Recreational Services.** (2-0) Discusses the process of rehabilitation from both a physical and mental perspective. Explores the concept of goal-directed therapy. Addresses the therapeutic uses of recreation and provides opportunities for creative application. Includes the utilization of both internal and external resources to meet identified objectives.

**3322 Organization of Long-Term Health Care Facilities.** (3-0) Discussion of the history, philosophy, and purposes of long-term health care facilities. Analysis of organizational models. Comparative analysis of ownership structures and options including both private and corporate designs.

**3323 Regulatory Aspects of Long-Term Health Care.** (3-0) Focuses specifically on regulations regarding the operation of long-term health care facilities as promulgated by both the federal and state governments. Reviews the minimum requirements for licensure and the standards for participation relative to both intermediate care and skilled care facilities in the State of Texas. Also discusses specific activities and functions regarding accountability and enforcement procedures.

**3324 Management of Long-Term Health Care Facilities.** (3-0) Overview of management theories and concepts with specific applications to long-term health care facilities. In-depth discussion of a wide variety of areas, the management of individual departments, line and staff relationships, staffing patterns, policy and procedures, formulation, planning, coordination, control, and communication.

**4204 Principles of Nutrition and Food Service Management.** (2-0) Discusses the metabolic process and includes fundamental principles of nutrition. Incorporates the nutritional aspects of normal and therapeutic diets relative to patient/resident requirements. Addresses other components of long-term health care food service including kitchen design, menu planning, budgeting, purchasing, and quantity food preparation. Comparatively analyzes food service systems and service components. Focuses on state standards and Life Safety Code requirements. Discusses the role as well as the utilization of professional consultants. Reviews methods and systems of documentation relative to compliance with existing rules and regulations.

**4206 Environmental Services Management.** (2-0) Includes basic approaches to infection and vector control. Explores principles of sanitation and microbiology. Discusses requirements for effective housekeeping and laundry services.

**4208 Contemporary National and International Long-Term Health Care Delivery Systems.** (2-0) Comparatively analyzes selected systems of long-term health care delivery on both a national and international basis. Discusses the advantages and disadvantages relative to each system and explores multiple applications of viable components.

**4310 Planning, Design, and Construction of Long-Term Health Care Facilities.** (3-0) Focuses on location considerations, construction requirements and regulations, exterior and interior design, and traditional and non-traditional design concepts.

**4315 Interdisciplinary Principles of Resident Care.** (3-0) Focuses on interdepartmental services and the necessary interrelationships to insure quality patient care. Discusses methods to establish and maintain the requisite relationships. Includes a review of policies and procedures involved in the provision of therapeutic long-term health care. Emphasizes the principles of the identified individual therapies. Suggests systems to facilitate the integration of the therapies into the patient's therapeutic regimen.

**4320 Resident, Family, and Community Relationships.** (3-0) Identifies and discusses the requisite components for establishing and maintaining effective and productive relationships with residents and their families and also with members of the community. Explores the dynamics involved in the long-term health care environment and discusses approaches involving the utilization of family and community resources to maximize the quality of life for each resident/patient.

**4321 Internship/Practicum.** (3-0) Management-centered internship supervised by a preceptor-Administrator approved by the State Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators. Internship must be served in a currently licensed and approved facility. Includes classroom processing of field experiences to interrelate the didactic and clinical components of the experience. Must be repeated for credit as required in the curriculum.

Practicum component may be utilized to meet the needs of students who have successfully completed an approved internship as a part of a previous program. Practicum includes management-oriented experiences designed to provide additional opportunities for observation, participation, and practical application of administrative skills in a long-term health care facility. Student must secure permission from the Department Chair before enrolling in the Practicum. Must be repeated for credit as required in the curriculum.
