**1. TSUS: Appointment of William L. Kibler, Ph.D. as president of Sul Ross State University**

Upon the Chancellor's recommendation and motion of Regent \_\_\_\_\_, seconded by Regent \_\_\_\_\_:

It was ordered that William L. Kibler, Ph.D. be hereby appointed president of Sul Ross State University, with a start date as soon as practicable, but no later than September 1, 2014.

**Explanation**

On June 18, 2014, in conformity with notice provisions of the Texas *Public Information Act, Government Code, Section 552.123*, Dr. William L. Kibler, vice president for student affairs at Mississippi State University, was announced as the sole finalist in the Sul Ross State University presidential search. Dr. Kibler was selected following a national search that began in January of this year. He will assume the presidency no later than September 1, 2014, upon mutual agreement between Dr. Kibler and the Chancellor.

Dr. Kibler earned an associate's degree in science from Pensacola Junior College, a bachelor's degree in economics, and a master's degree in counselor education from the University of Florida, and his doctorate in educational administration from Texas A&M University.

He began his professional career at the University of Florida in 1977 as the assistant to the dean for student services, becoming the assistant dean for student judicial affairs in 1979. In 1980, he joined the administration at Texas A&M University as the assistant director of student affairs, receiving several promotions in that office, culminating in an interim appointment as the vice president for student affairs in 2003. Dr. Kibler moved to Mississippi State University in 2004 to assume his current position as vice president for student affairs.
