A Rationale for a New Association

Introduction. Because there is no association that currently meets the needs and interests of student learning support center administrators and staff in post secondary institutions, it is proposed that such an association be formed as the Association for Administrators of Learning Support Centers in Higher Education. The purpose of the Association for Administrators of Learning Support Centers in Higher Education (AALSCHE) is to provide services related to the development and management of learning support centers and their programs and services. The Association will seek to accomplish its purpose by: a.) Engaging in the specific and general coordination of efforts with other national, regional, and state organizations and persons

having purposes supportive of or in harmony with AALSCHE concerns.

- b.) Promoting and sponsoring research, evaluation, programming and training efforts among and within its individual and institutional membership.
- c.) Providing for an annual national conference for its membership and such other regional and local conferences and workshops as resources permit.
- d.) Encouraging the development and expansion of a communications network. Toward this end, the Association will sponsor a membership WebBoard and will regularly web publish a newsletter and other special mailings of significant events and developments of particular interest to its members.

Learning Support Centers are recognized by many different names: Learning Centers, Learning Assistance Centers, Student Learning Assistance Centers, Academic Support Centers, Academic Success Centers, Learning Assistance Resource Centers, etc. However, for the purpose of membership in AALSCHE, a learning support center is defined as an administrative entity in a campus location supporting one or more services such as tutoring, writing, learning skills, supplemental instruction, conversation lab, learning disabilities, independent self-paced learning, or academic skills counseling.

The organizations that were considered as potentially useful for learning support center administrators and staff were the following: College Reading & Learning Association (CRLA), National Association for Developmental Education (NADE), and Midwest College Learning Center Association (MCLCA).

CRLA comes closest to being an appropriate organization because many Learning Support administrators and staff are members. It also has a Learning Center Management SIG with over 100 members. However, when one reads the recent Strategic Plan, developed in 1998, one finds that under "Purpose: Why Do We Exist? that of the 8 reasons given, only one "provide leadership in learning assistance, mentions learning assistance although this term seems to be identified with developmental education." (p. 2) There is no mention of learning support centers under any title here although in a section entitled.

"Vision," the last item reads: "focus: tutoria!, learning center management, reading, math," (p.4). Under "Auditing the Environment: External Audit/Demographic, one finds this statistic: "More than 60,000 adjunct or full-time staff and faculty work in developmental education and learning assistance centers." (p. 5). Under External Audit/Educational, one find a statement regarding the "Evolution of "full service learning centers" from developmental education departments (p.6).

Under"Navigating the Audit Results/External/Opportunities," an allusion is made to THE NADE certification programs for learning assistance centers." (p.8). Also, in the section, "Operationalizing the Strategic Plan/ Establishing Annual Objectives, #6, Increase the visibility of Association projects, programs, and publications," an objective is to "Market the Learning Center Management Monograph." (p.13). Finally it is noted that the terms "developmental education" (17 times) and "learning assistance" without an additional qualifier to indicate a center (6 times) were used for a total of 23 times. The term, "learning assistance," seems to be used as a synonym for developmental education.

NADE began as the National Association for Remedial/ Developmental Studies in PostSecondary Education and has been associated with developmental education since its inception. Rarely are learning support centers alluded to in NADE official documents. One exception is in NADE'S CODE OF ETHICS: Statement of Ethical Practice for Developmental Education Departments and Learning Assistance Centers. NADE Policy is based upon a document developed by the Council for the Advancement of Standards of which NADE is a member association.

MCLCA comes closest to being an organization for learning support center professionals as evidenced by the following objectives for the organization:1) to promote professional standards for learning centers through education, curriculum design, research and evaluation, 2) to promote support for learning centers by acting on issues affecting learning assistance programs, and 3) to assist in the development of new learning centers and of learning center personnel. However, its institutes and journal issues focus more on developmental education, or as it is called, "learning assistance," than on learning support center development and management. However, it should be noted that MCLCA, a regional association for many years, now has announced that it is a national association for learning assistance directors and staff. I do not think that a merger with MCLCA is appropriate and an independent organization might dilute the membership of CRLA.

In Review. For many years I have felt that my colleagues who are administrators and staff in learning support centers do not have the professional growth and networking opportunities that they need. CRLA was originally founded as a reading association and currently emphasizes learning assistance/developmental education in its conference presentations, association

publications, and strategic planning. I have found it increasingly more difficult to distinguish the professional activities of CRLA from that of its sister association, NADE. Both emphasize programs and services that are essentially characterized as developmental/remedial. In talking with many learning support administrators and staff, especially those from major universities, I became aware that they do not join either CRLA or NADE because neither association meets their special needs regarding center facilities and program management. The Winter Institute has filled this niche admirably for the past nine years through presentations and a web site that focuses on learning support center development and management.

Proposal. I am not proposing that a new association be formed independently from CRLA, I am, however, proposing that CRLA consider sponsoring under its aegis a new association dedicated exclusively to the needs and concerns of learning support center administrators and staff. This new association, tentatively called Association for Administrators of Learning Support Centers in Higher Education, can be an affiliate of CRLA similar to the status of the CCCC to its parent organization, NCTE.

Briefly, here are some details. CRLA would assist AALSCHE with start-up funds. AALSCHE would have its own constitution, by laws, and officers. A CRLA Board member would sit on AALSCHE board as an ex officio member and reciprocally an AALSCHE member on the CRLA Board in an ex officio capacity. AALSCHE would have its own web site as it does now under the umbrella of the Winter Institute with the obvious collegial linkage to CRLA

As a founding member, past president, and proceedings and newsletter editor of CRLA, then called WCRA, I have the greatest admiration and respect for CRLA. its officers, and members but I strongly believe that the founding of a new association exclusively for learning support center administrators under the aegis of CRLA would not only meet their special needs but also would serve to strengthen CRLA's membership and professional stature.



To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing to recommend for your attention Dave Lemire who worked at Turner High School as the Effective Schools Liaison. I was principal from 1993 to 1996 and make this recommendation based on (1) Dave Lemire's work in a new position at Turner High School, (2) his personal knowledge and initiative, and (3) his personal and interpersonal skills.

As a result of Turner High School's work on the school improvement process, the administration and staff thought a person was needed to initiate and to facilitate some of the action plans which staff had decided to implement during the 1995-96 school year. A new position was created entitled Effective Schools Liaison. Dave Lemire was hired for that position. Part of Dave's position was to facilitate the professional staff's implementation of a program entitled "Reading-To-Learn" and to determine staff's ability to deal with the implementation of the Block Schedule. Within the Block Schedule there was a specific time set aside for staff planning. Dave Lemire facilitated those staff planning times by scheduling weekly 45 minute Friday sessions during the entire day when staff were free. He planned and gathered data from staff about the levels of implementation and what might improve the success of the action plan. Dave handled these sessions quite well as demonstrated by the staff attendance at these sessions.

In addition, Dave Lemire also has become involved in the overall school improvement effort at THS embodied in the "High Schools That Work" (HSTW) program. Dave joined with other staff on the curriculum work which aims at increasing the level of performance of students in communications, math, and science by particularly emphasizing the need for focused and sequence programs of study which students need to pursue in order to enter into higher paying careers. He followed up on the curriculum work by gathering research materials and promoted the career emphasis among staff members by aiding in the guidance emphasis implicit in HSTW.

A portion of the Effective Schools Liaison position calls for work with teachers to help with their instruction. Dave Lemire has quietly worked with a few teachers by observing and reflecting back what has occurred in the teachers' classrooms. However, he did not feel that his success on that level was significant enough. Consequently, when given the opportunity to teach one section of Social Studies he readily accepted the challenge, because he thought it would aid him in identifying himself more closely with the teaching situation. Dave now believes that he has been able to make progress in relating to teachers regarding classroom instruction, because he too is teaching.

"The mission of the Turner High School community is to create opportunities for success by challenging students to become responsible, decision-making adults."
